Amateur golfers prevail

BREWSTER - The amateurs defeated the golf pros, 91/2 to 81/2, yesterday at Ocean Edge Resort and Conference Center in the inaugural Cape Cod Cup on a perfect late summer afternoon.

CAPE COD CUP

Two of the Cape's top amateurs met two of the Cape's club pros in each of the six best-ball matches. One point was awarded for winning the full match, and one point was awarded for winning the front and back nines. Halves earned each team

a half point.

Three of the matches were shutouts, and two of those were earned by the amateurs. Kevin Carey, club champ at both Dennis Pines and Dennis Highlands, teamed with Jim Horvath to sweep three points from pros Ron Hallet of Ocean Edge and Don Deay of Captains. Amateurs John Tew of Wianno and Paul Heffernan of Eastward Ho! blanked Gary Philbrick of Cranberry Valley and Bob Chase of Ocean Edge. Getting half of those points back for the pros were Bob Miller (Blue Rock) and Rick Johnson (Hyannisport), 3-0 winners over Jerry Bellis of New Seabury and Paul Carr of Ocean Edge.

The whole affair would have been deadlocked except for a collapse on the final two holes by Mickey Herron and Rich Iwaszko. Herron (Bay Point CC pro) and Iwaszko (Quash-net Valley pro) won, 2½-½, over Ocean Edge club champion Leon Kumpe (a title he won yesterday morning) and Oyster Harbors' Dick

and 5, but were kicking themselves for blowing the final two holes to fall into a backside halve.

Iwaszko three-putted the par-3 17th for a loss and dropped the backside even. On the 597-yard par-5 18th, the long-hitting Herron reached the green in 2 and proceeded to threeputt the hole away from 70 feet.

Herron and Iwaszko were 6-up after nine, thanks to four birdies.

Coming up big for the amateurs were Skip Duprey (Cummaquid) and Sandy Dowling (Hyannisport), 21/2-1/2 over Ted Osburn (White Cliffs) and

Tom Cavicchi (Oyster Harbors).
"We teamed up for 3-under," said Duprey, who made four birdies. "And when I was making bogeys,

Sandy was making pars.'

Duprey and Dowling were 1-down before Duprey birdled 10, 13 and 14 -13 from 35 feet over a hump.

"Those two birdies broke our

back," said Osburn.

It was a dapper John Boniface who fired a 71 on his own ball as he and Jay Haberl edged Peter Stephen and Ed Monteiro, 21/2-1/2. Boniface, a New Seabury assistant, was bedecked in yellow knickers, yellow polka-dot stockings and tie, a long-sleeved white shirt and yellow cap.

Boniface and Haberl won the first two holes. Stephen, the Bourne High golf coach, and Monteiro, out of Bay Point CC, won 3 and 4 to pull even.

Their match stayed that way until Boniface got up and down from the trap on 10 for a birdie win, then captured 11 with a par. Stephen rimmed out a par putt on 16, while Boniface made his, and the match was over, 3

"We had a good match," said Boniface. "There were only a couple of bogeys that won best ball. We teamed

up well; read each other's putts and had a good time.'

Horvath and Carey won the front side, 1-up and the back 3-up, making six birdies on the way to their win. Their six birds offset a pair of spectacular birds by Deay and Hallet. Deay chipped in from the back of the green on the 601-yard 8th hole for 4. and Hallet rolled in a 70-footer from

the back of the 10th green for 3.

But Horvath and Carey were 3-under on their own ball, and the lefthanded Carey, a former Cape Amateur champ, closed out the match with a birdie 2 on the 216-yard 17th after hitting a 3-iron to within 8 feet.

Heffernan and Tew won each side 1-up in their victory over Philbrick and Chase.

Tew shot 71 on his own ball, using his head around the course.

"I only pulled my driver out twice," said Tew. Heffernan closed out the match with a par on 18.

Miller and Johnson were 5-and-4 winners over Bellis and Carr. Miller holds the course record at Ocean Edge, and yesterday he and Johnson finished 3-under best ball in a bogeyless round.

"If you don't make bogeys around here you should be in good shape," said Miller. "The pins were tough, but the good thing was the greens were a little soft because of the rain.

"The turning point came after we were even after six. I won 7 with par, Rick won 8 with par, and Rick then birdied 9 to put us 3-up."

Johnson's bird came after he hit his second shot from the edge of the

woods to 8 feet.


"This is the first match-play round of golf I've played against an amateur since I became a golf pro 15 years ago," said Miller. "Rick's and my philosophy today was to see if we could get one of our balls under par."

Amateurs capture second Cape Cod Cup win, 12-6

BREWSTER - In golf tournaments, many times the margin of difference at the end of a match can be deceiving.

Yesterday's final score of the second annual Cape Cod Cup Challenge Match, pitting area professionals against local amateurs, at Ocean Edge Golf Resort was just such an incident.

The final score on the Cup will read Ama-teurs 12, Professionals 6. However, this truly was a case of the event being much closer than

As the six foursomes, featuring two players from each group battling for one point for winning each nine holes and another point for winning the entire 18 hole-match, made the turn after nine holes, the score was only 31/2-21/2 in favor of the amateurs.

To gain that advantage, the amateurs needed a birdie 3 on the ninth hole from Joe Henley of Woods Hole. His approach shot to the green ended up leaning on the edge of the hole, allowing he and his partner, Willowbend superinten-dent Bob St. Thomas, to halve the front nine with Willowbend professional Ted O'Rourke and Mickey Herron of Bay Pointe.

However, O'Rourke and Herron, this year's New England PGA Match-Play Champions, railied on the back side and held off the challengers to take the match, 21/2-1/2 (a team is awarded a half-point when it ties in any of the three matches)

The only match that turned out to be somewhat lopsided was the first. Jim Maddalena of Hyannisport Club and Cummaquid's Ollie Hallet logged the day's only sweep, taking all three points in their match with reigning Cape Cod Chapter NEPGA champion Tom Shea of Kittansett and Oyster Harbors assistant Jay Wick.

In fact, Hallet and Maddalena might have swept any match they played as the pair combined for seven birdies and two bogeys to finish 5-under as a team.

All the other matches came down to the last hole.

For the second consecutive year, John Tew of Wianno and Eastward Ho's Paul Heffernan closed out the pro tandem of Bob Chase of Quashnet Valley and Cranberry Valley's Gary Philbrick on the final hole to capture that match 21/2-1/2. The two teams battled to a frontnine halve.

In the fourth match of the event, professionals Ron Hallet and John Scheffler of Eastward Ho! pulled off the day's biggest surprise by recording a 2-1 win over amateur team captain Jim Horvath of Dennis Highlands and Kevin Carey of Dennis Pines.

The pro duo built a 3-up lead after nine holes when they combined to be 3-under par at the turn. However, Horvath and Carey battled back to win the back nine and had a chance to deadlock the entire match but their birdie bids on the par-5 18th went awry

It took a four-foot par putt on the final hole by Jay Cassidy of Woods Hole to lock up his match. Cassidy and his partner, Bob Burke, who earlier in the day had won the Bayberry Hills Golf Course club championship, beat professionals Ted Osburn of White Cliffs and Abbott Baker of Cape Cod Country Club. The loss overshadowed an even-par 72 by Osburn.

The day's final match was won by the amateur team of Skip Duprey of Cummaquid and Hyannisport's Bob Quirk over Woods Hole's Dutch Wessner and Mark Heartfield of Sankaty Head, 214-15.

The amateur team won the opening nine, 1-up and then played the back side even.


'I think this whole event is great," said firsttime participant Ted O'Rourke. "There are a lot of good amateurs here on the Cape and its a unique opportunity for us to get to know them better.'

Of the 24 players who participated in the event, only eight participated in last year's inaugural event, also won by the amateur team, 91/2-81/2.

Amateurs pull out win in Cape Cod Cup

COTUIT - Darkness was closing in. The weather was atrocious and the outcome of the third annual Cape Cod Cup was hanging in the balance, as the final foursome of the day trudged back out into the rain to complete the suspended match at the Wil-

lowbend Club in Cotuit.

The drama was there, and to make it a fitting ending to the day's competition, Willowbend Club owner Dan Hostetter splashed in a 20-footer on the 18th hole to lift the amateur team to a come-from-behind, 2-1 win over pro Tom Cavicchi of Oyster Harbors and Ted Osburn of White Cliffs. That win enabled the amateurs to record an 11-10 victory in the overall team

The wind and weather must have made it seem like old hat for Hostetter and partner Bob St. Thomas. They have teamed to win three Seagulls titles at Hyannisport, a spring-time event which usually features weather similiar to yesterday's

conditions

St. Thomas, director of golf at Willowbend, sank a four-foot putt on the rain-soaked 17th green after the teams returned to the course to finish the match. The sky was darkening and the players were mere shadows.

The dramatic victory ended the pros attempt to wrest the trophy away from the amateurs, who have now won the Cape Cod Cup every year since its inception in 1987

The pros put together a formidable team and it looked as if they might blow the amateurs out of the match following completion of the front nine. The pros held a lopsided, 5-2 edge at that point.

However, the weather was turning nasty and as it worsened, the amateurs seemed to take control

Of the seven matches played, four of them were shutouts, with each one of those teams taking all three available points. Two of the matches ended tied at 11/2 points each, and the deciding match ended 2-1 in favor of the amateurs.

The pro senior team of Dave Marr of Ballymeade and his partner, John Scheffler of Eastward Ho!, had one of the shutouts, and they swept Mel Cowe of Plymouth and Peter Brown

of Cummaquid, 3-0.

Pros Bob Miller of Blue Rock and Rick Johnson of Hyannisport shut out the reigning Seagulls champions, Jack Maher and Mark Chasson, 3-0. Johnson praised the play of Miller, as they maintained their perfect record in the competiton.

"When Bobby is putting like he was today, nobody's going to beat him. he was around the hole all day," Johnson said.

The pros were two down after the first two holes, but then went on a rampage, winning four of the next seven holes to take a 2-up lead after nine. They closed out the 18-hole match on the 15th and the back nine on the next hole.

For the amateurs, the team of Peter Stephen of Pocasset and Tom Tobey of Bay Pointe blanked their pro opponents, Jay Wick of Oyster Harbors and Quashnet Valley's Bob

Chase, 3-0.
"Tom hits a big ball," praised Chase of the New England Intercollegiate champion, who played at Bourne High under Stephen, the school's golf coach. "But what's most impressive is his nice touch around the greens.'

That short game played a key role in beating the pros, as did the clutch putting of Stephen.

Two-time defending Cape Cod Amateur champion Joe Keller and partner Jerry Daly of Kittansett top-pled Mickey Herron and Brian O'Hearn, both of Bay Pointe Country Club. The amateurs won both the front and back, 1-up.

On the back nine it took a chip-in on the 18th hole by Daly to give the amateurs the three points for the match.

Two matches were halved and in each case it required a strong back-

nine comeback by the amateurs. Bob Quirk of Hyannisport and Plymouth's Ray Richard caught Tim Foran of Ballymeade and host pro Ted O'Rourke. A birdie on 15 by Richard and a conceeded birdle on the 16th was all the Quirk-Richards team

That then set the stage for the heroles of St. Thomas and Hostetter.

While the competition was keen, the cameraderie between the players was also a nice spinoff to the event.

For former PGA champion Dave Marr, it was a chance to meet a few more golfers in his new hometown


"This is great," he said. "It's good to be involved and it's good for the game of golf. Whoever came up with this concept should be congratulated. It's a perfect format."






Pros get first win over ams

That is the current situation of Ted O'Rourke, the Willowbend Club head pro.

CAPE COD CUP GOLF

O'Rourke, fresh from his win in the New England Open Championship last week, yesterday captained the Cape Cod area golf professionals to their first victory in the Cape Cod Challenge Cup, defeating the amateurs, 12-9.

The amateurs had won the first three editions of this match, which pits seven two-man teams of amateurs against seven pro teams. However, all the matches had been close and yesterday was no exception.

The final score will go down as 12-9. What it does not show is that as late as the 13th hole, four of the matches were even, the pros led one and the amateurs were up by one in the other two.

Each match was worth three points, one for the front nine, one for the back nine and one for the 18-hole match.

The pros swept two of the seven matches and took 2½ points in another. The amateurs took two matches with 2½ points and another with two.

To emphasize how good the golf was, two teams shot a best ball of four-under-par 67 on the par-71, 6,637-yard course.

The amateur tandem of Hyannisport members John Shields and Mike Berube were 4-under in their match against Plymouth pro Dan Neary and Willowbend assistant Mike McGoldrick. The amateurs won that one, 2½-½, with the two teams playing the front nine even.

The pro team of Rick Johnson (Hyannisport) and Bob Miller (Blue Rock), which has never lost a match in the four years of the event, also fired 4-under 67 as a team. Yesterday the two pros had

five birdies and a bogey in their 2½-½ win over Woods Hole's Joe Henley and Bayberry Hills' Terry Deleo.

Another team that has played in all four events and has yet to lose is the amateur pairing of Dennis Highlands' Jim Horvath and Kevin Carey of Dennis Pines. They won yesterday, 2½-½ over the pro team of Gary Philbrick (Cranberry Valley) and Bob Chase (Quashnet Valley). The amateur tandem was 3-under on its ball.

The final foursome of the day was an even match that had pros Jack Bohman (Blue Rock) and Tom Cavicchi (Oyster Harbors) battling amateurs Ray Richard and Rick Cunha of Plymouth to a deadlock. Each team earned 1½ points.

The two whitewashings were crucial for the pros.

The first was in the opening pairing with the tandem of Ron Hallett of Ocean Edge and Cummaquid assistant Wade Callander taking all three points against Ed Fletcher of Bay Pointe and Dennis Pines club champion Keith Lewis.

A birdie 4 on the 18th hole by Callander (a six-footer that curled in after Fletcher just missed a 10foot eagle try) sealed the win.

The featured match of the day

had high-powered amateurs Joe Keller (Oyster Harbors) and Skip Duprey (Cummaquid) taking on O'Rourke, New England's hottest pro, and Mark Heartfield of Sankaty Head.

This was the match many people were talking about before the day began. Some felt O'Rourke made a mistake putting his twosome up against the iron of the amateurs, but as O'Rourke said, "I've never been one to back down from a challenge."

This match, which was actually the fourth off the tee, was the turning point of the 1990 Cup as the pros took all three points, winning both sides of the match 1-up.

"I guess the strategy worked out pretty well," O'Rourke said. "My first instinct was to put iron against iron. There were some people who said it might not work out. But I guess it did."

Amateur captain Duprey handled the defeat in stride saying, jokingly, "I feel like Ryder Cup captain Ray Floyd. We were ambushed out there."

The local pro contingent now controls bragging rights over the amateurs for the next year.

As the pros' Bob Miller said, "How sweet it is."

Cape amateurs rally to tie pros at 10½

CUMMAQUID — Halfway through yesterday's Cape Cod Cup challenge match between the Cape area golf pros and a team of local amateurs, things were looking bleak for the amateurs.

The pros had rolled through the front nine and amassed a 4½-2½ lead. In two of those matches, the

pros led by 3-up or better.

But a funny thing happened on the way to a second consecutive pro victory in the five-year old event. The amateurs rallied, especially in the final three matches, and manged to score eight of the final nine available points to forge a 10½-10½ tie with the pros at Cummaquid Golf Club.

"What could be better than to have it all come down to the last match, the last hole, the last putt to determine it all," said amateur captain Dick Stimets. "This was a great time and a great match."

Todd Barrett of the host club and his partner, Fred Walker of Cranberry Valley Golf Course, took all three points in their match, with pros Mike Pry of New Seabury and Tim Foran of Ballymeade.

It took a two-foot Barrett putt on the 18th hole to deadlock the match and win the points for the

amateurs.

The comeback put only the slightest tinge to the day's most spectacular individual effort, a 7-1 under-par 64 by Bay Pointe assistant pro Tom Tobey.

Tobey, who has plans of playing the club professional circuit in Florida this winter, teamed with Blue Rock assistant Jack Bohman to log the most lopsided win of the day, 5 and 4, over amateurs Paul Heffernan of Eastward Ho! and Woods Hole's Joe Henley.

Tobey had seven birdies and no bogeys in his round, which he called, "easily the best round of golf I've ever played." To add insult to a resounding defeat, Bohman added a pair of birdies on holes Tobey did not, and the tandem ended the day with an impressive 9-under-par 62.

This prompted Heffernan to say sarcastically to Stimets at the 18th green, "Thanks for the pairing, Dick. It was nice to watch this match."

The opening match saw the biggest swing as the pro team of Ron Hallett of Ocean Edge and Allan Stewart of Cummaquid jumped

out to a 4-up lead after nine holes, on the strength of Hallett's 4-under par 32 on the front nine.

However, their amateur opponents, Sven Tilly of Cummaquid and Stimets, rallied and won the back nine by the same 4-up spread, thus dividing the three possible points from each match.

Stimets had the hot back nine with three birdies, but everyone in the foursome was talking about Tilly's 1-iron shot to within 10 feet of the hole for a win on the 17th as the key to victory.

The second amateur win during the comeback featured Dan Coon of New Seabury and Mike Berube of Hyannisport, the reigning Seagulls champions, overtaking Tom Cavicchi of Oyster Harbors and Quashnet Valley's Bob Chase.

The pros held a 1-up edge after nine, but two birdies on the back gave the amateurs that side and the overall match, and two of the three points.

In a match featuring five-year veteran teams from both sides — Jim Horvath and Kevin Carey of Dennis Pines for the amateurs, and pros Bob Miller of Blue Rock (the captain) and Hyannisport's Rick Johnson — birdies on the final three holes culminated a round that saw the amateurs shoot a bestball score of 66 and win the match 2-up.

In that match, the last five holes were birdied, prompting Miller to say, "That was the best match I've been in in quite a while. The whole day was terrific, partly because the golf was so good out there."

Prior to that, it looked as if the pros were going to cruise to the win and cut the amateur lead in the series to 3-2. Since the previous winner, as in the Ryder Cup, retains possession of the cup when there's a tie, the pros will hold it for another year.

David O'Kelly of Willowbend and John Scheffler of Eastward Ho! logged a 2½-½ win over the amateur team of Skip Duprey and Ray Richard. The pros built a 3-up edge on the first nine and won the overall match, 3-up.

The pro team of Mickey Herron of Bay Pointe and Paul Tessier of Wianno broke open an even match on the back nine and logged a I-up win over Joe Keller of Oyster Harbors and Ollie Hallet of Cummaquid. Herron recorded six birdies in his round.

Originally the event was started as a way to get the pros and amateurs together in a competitive and social setting.

"As we all know, this was originally established to help us all to better get acquainted in a golf setting," said Stimets. "I would say it more than accomplished that feat. It was a wonderful day."

And one that drew no blood.







Amateurs drub pros

WOODS HOLE — After a two-year hiatus, the amateur golfers of Cape Cod regained possession of the Cape Cod Cup with yesterday's thrashing of the professionals in the sixth annual challenge match at scenic Woods Hole Golf Club.

The amateurs, led by captain Joe Henley, the club champion at the host club, blistered the pros, 13½-7½, to wrest the cup from the pros,

who had held it since 1990.

Henley and his partner, Joe Keller of Oyster Harbors, broke open a close match with David O'Kelly, the head pro at Willowbend, and Cape Cod Country Club assistant John Munroe with a blitz of five straight wins (holes 11 through 15) that included three birdies and two pars. It lifted the team to a 4-and-3 win and a 3-0 sweep of the points available to each team.

Henley led the charge with a 4-under-par 67, the day's best individual score, over the 6,117yard, par-71 layout that overlooks Buzzards Bay, Vineyard Sound and the village of Woods Hole.

The format of the match calls for two-man teams to play best-ball format for three points in a match. One point is issued for winning the front nine, one for the back nine and one for the entire match.

After the seven groups had completed the front nine, the amateurs held a 4-3 advantage, which set the stage for a number of back-nine performances that lifted the amateurs to the win and a 4-1-1 advantage in the six-year-old event, which is presented by Antigua Sportswear and Titleist.

In the first match, the Plymouth Country Club tandem of Rick Cunha and Ray Richard topped the pro tandem of Bruce Murphy (Brookside Golf Course) and Sam Bennett (Farm Neck), 21/2-1/2.

The amateurs overcame a 2-down deficit on the back nine to tie that side and take the overall match.

In the second match, Dan Coon of New Seabury lifted the amateur team into a tie by birdieing the final two holes, including a 22-footer on No. 18. He and partner Chris Newman of the host club trailed the match against pros Mike Berube of New Seabury and Mike McBroom of

But many of the players remembered last year when the pros only needed two points in the final three groups to win and could only get 1½ points and a tie of the match.

The big gun for the pros last year was Tom Tobey, an assistant at Bay Pointe who shot 64 on his own ball at Cummaquid and paced a 3-0 rout of the amateur opponents.

Yesterday, Tobey received a dose of his own medicine in the form of amateurs Kevin Carey of Dennis Highlands and Jim Horvath of Dennis Pines.

Tobey and partner Mike Haberl of Olde Barnstable Fairgrounds took the front-nine point, 1up.

But, a 25-foot birdie putt by Carey narrowed the margin to one on the treacherous ninth hole and signaled that something was about to happen.

Carey proceeded to birdie four of the next seven holes - 10, 12, 14 and 16. That surge, along with some clutch halves on that side by Horvath, lifted them to a 2-up win on the back and a 2-1 win in the match.

Tim Foran of Ballymeade and Sankaty Head assistant pro Jeff Moyher breathed life into the pro team when they rallied on the back nine, led by Foran's four-birdie surge, to salvage a tie against amateurs Ed Fletcher of Bay Pointe and Jim Maddalena of Willowbend.


The amateur team led after the front nine, 2 up. Only Foran's six-foot birdie putt on the ninth prevented a rout from getting under way.

POCASSET — Before the start of yesterday's 7th edition of the Cape Cod Cup Challenge Match between amateur and professional golfers, amateur captain Kevin Carey said this was the strongest team the pros had fielded since their lone win in 1990.

Carey proved to be a prophet as the pros logged their second win in the seven years of this event, 11½-9½ at Pocasset Golf Club.

Unlike last year's relatively easy romp by the amateurs, this year's event went down to the final group (the seniors pairing) before the outcome was decided.

For the pros, things looked bleak after the the amateurs grabbed a 7½-4½ advantage. However, the final three groups on the course swung the match and assured the pros the win as they copped seven of the final nine points.

No single match was the key for the pros, though many would call the 2½-½ win by Bay Pointe pro Mickey Herron and host pro Rich Iwaszko over Ed Fletcher (Bay Pointe) and Jacques Wullschleger (Sankaty Head) the pivotal one of the day.

In that battle, Iwaszko and Herron battled to a halve of the front nine and the two teams were even until a three-birdies-in-three-holes explosion by the pros, starting on No. 14, closed out the match on the 16th hole.

From there on, it seemed as if the pros called the shots and controlled the outcome.

In the second-to-last match, the tandem of Quashnet Valley pro Bob Chase and Willowbend's David O'Kelly cruised to a 2-1 win. Only a trio of birdies on the final four holes by amateur tandem of Tom Creavy of Hyannisport and Bourne resident Ray Richard.

Richards, the reigning Cape Cod Amateur champion, birdied the final hole to give the amateur team an improbable point in that match and force the outcome to the final pairings. In that shootout, the pro team of John Scheffler of Eastward Ho! and team captain Ron Hallett of Ocean Edge raced out to a 3-up advantage after the first nine and 4-up after a birdie on No. 10 to virtually lock it up. The amateurs managed to halve the back side and avoid being shut out.

"This win came at a good time for us," said Hallett, who played despite a bad hand that came out of a cast less than 10 days ago. "I felt we had a solid team all along. I kid that the reason it was so good this year is that first I ordered the shirt sizes for the team and then had to find the players to fit the shirts. But all along I thought we could win it this year if we got the type of play these guys are capable of."

In the early going, the amateur team grabbed the lead on the strength of a 2½-½ win by host team Peter Stephen and Steve Molis over the pro tandem of John Munroe and John Boniface.

When asked if they felt home course was an advantage, Stephen said, "It certainly helps, especially here."

Molis talked about winning holes 13, 14 and 16 to lock up the victory.

"Anyone who plays here a lot knows the course starts on the 14th in match play. That's where the matches are decided," he said.

Amateurs regain Cape Cod Cup

MARION — After losing seven of the final nine available points and dropping the 1993 version of the Cape Cod Cup, the amateur team of competitors in yesterday's eighth edition of the challenge match had a mission: Get the Cup back.

Mission accomplished.

Riding the crest of a pair of sweeps in which amateur teams captured the three available points in each match, the amateur team topped the professionals 12-9 at the scenic seaside Kittansett Club layout.

The win gives the amateurs a 5-2-1 advantage in the competition.

The fifth of the seven matches clinched the victory for the amateur team when the tandem of Woods Hole's Joe Henley and team captain Jerry Daly, a six-time Kittansett Club champion, battled the Blue Rock professional team of Bob Miller and Jack Bohman to a draw, 11/2-11/2.

This was the closest match of the day as neither twosome could gain more than a 1-up advantage. "It was a great match," Bohman said.

The final hole pretty much symbolized the round when Henley's 14-foot bid for a win stopped just to the right of the hole. Miller, whose putt was almost as long, left his winning bid just to the left of the hole.

The amateur victory overshadowed one of the great performances of the day, the round pieced together by the professional team of John Boniface (The Ridge Club) and Rusty Gunnarson (Bay Pointe).

They swept their match against Ray Richard of Bourne (and a member at Thorny Lea in Brockton) and Chris Tufts of Willowbend, and took all three available points. It wasn't so much that the amateur duo played badly, it was the fact the pros were red-hot.

The match was closed out on the 16th hole, and in that 16-hole stretch Boniface and Gunnarson recorded eight birdies.

"It was unbelievable," Richard said. "It seemed like each time one was out of the hole, the other was making a birdie."

For the amateurs, it was a good thing that they clinched the Cup before the final two matches came in because those sitting in the clubhouse might have been biting their nails.

Once again the late professional teams were blitzing the amateurs, this time capturing five of the final six points, but it was too late to change the outcome.

In the early matches, with one exception, the amateurs led almost from start to finish.

The opening match set the tone as the tandem of Mike McCarthy of Hyannisport and Eastward Ho!'s Paul Heffernan grabbed a two-hole advantage on the front nine, led by a pair of Heffernan birdies, and cruised home a winner, closing out the match on the 16th hole.

"We both played well," McCarthy said. "We were 5-under-par when the match ended. Paul made some clutch birdies out there."

John McManus of the Hyannis Golf Club and his partner, Mike Ghelfi of Ballymeade, both competing in this event for the first time, never showed any rookie tendencies in capturing all three points in their match against the team of Mike Haberl of Olde Barnstable Fairgrounds and Cape Cod Country Club's John Munroe.

It was a four-hole stretch that pretty much locked up that match, starting with Ghelfi's win with a par on the ninth hole to capture the front nine, 1-up. That was followed



11 and 12.

When McManus put the amateur team up with a birdie on the 14th, it was just a matter of time before this one ended. Another birdie by McManus on 16 sealed the win.

In the senior match, the amateur tandem of Ed Fletcher (Bay Pointe) and Dick Stimets (Oyster Harbors) vaulted to a four-hole advantage over the front nine but on the back, the pro duo of Trevor Bateman (Kings Way) and Ron Hallett (Ocean Edge) regrouped and battled even.

The lone bright spot for the pros in the first five matches was the tandem of Rich Iwaszko of Pocasset and Quashnet Valley's Bob Chase, which took two points in its match against Jim Horvath (Den-

The amateurs won the final two holes on the front to overcome a 1down situation and capture a point. But on the back side, the pros took control and captured the side 2-up, winning the overall match 1-up.

Kevin Carey and Joe Walker of Dennis Pines rallied for a point on the back side to prevent the pro team of John Scheffler (Eastward Ho!) and David O'Kelly from picking up all three points.


Last year, the pros collected five of the last six points after the match had already been decided.

Cape NEPGA pros run away from amateurs

HYANNIS PORT — Showing its overall depth, the Cape Cod Chapter of the New England FGA captured its second win in a row over the Cape area amateurs, 14½ to 6½, in the 12th annual Top-Flite Etonic Cape Cod Cup held at the picturesque Hyannisport Club yesterday afternoon.

Of the seven matches played on a brilliant fall day at a layout known for its dramatic weather changes, the Chapter pros won five of them, including two by 3-0 scores. Boniface, wielding a blazing flat stick, sank five birdies in the Ryder Cup-style match, where one point is awarded per nine holes and another point for the winner of the overall match.

"It's very beneficial having the host pro read the putts for you," noted Boniface. "I putted well today and Rick was a big reason why."

In a matchup of seniors, pro John Scheffler of Eastward Hol and Ron Hallett of Ocean Edge took the measure of their opponents, Dick Stimets of Oyster Harbors and amateur captain Jack Maher of the host club, 2½ to ½. The keys to this win for the pros were holes 11, 12 and 15, each of which was won with a par.

Long-hitting John Munroe of Cape Cod and fellow pro Craig Garris of Ballymeade downed the amateur duo of John Shields of the host club and Rick Rainville of Olde Barnstable by the same 2½ to ½ margin. Munroe and Garris combined to shoot 4-under on their final eight holes to secure the win.

Munroe's two-putt birdie on the par-5 ninth and Garris's birdie on the tricky par-4 10th were keys to the win.

Amateurs Ed Fletcher of Bay Pointe and his partner, Roger Hoyt of Eastward Ho!, took a 2-1 win over Mike Haberl of Olde Barnstable and Bob Chase of Quashnet Valley. Fletcher was 3-under on his own ball through 15 holes before the pros rallied to win the last three holes to salvage a point in the match.

Island pros Allan Menne of Mink Meadows and Mark Heartfield of Sankaty Head halved their match with Joe Keller of Hyannis and Dick King of Willowbend, 1½ to 1½.

Red-hot pros Mike Ghelfi of Ballymeade and Tim McLaughlin of Eastward Ho!, both of whom have been dominant in Chapter events this year, combined to fire seven birdies to blitz Jim Horvath of Dennis Pines and Brian Secia of Miacomet, 3-0. McLaughlin had four birds, including a tap-in from three inches on the difficult par-4 third, while Ghelfi added three, including a birdie deuce on the par-3 15th.

The final match of the day saw the amateur team of Steve Molis of Pocasset and lefty Kevin Carey of Dennis Highlands edge Jim Maddalena of Willowbend and Bob Miller of Blue Rock, 2-1, in a tight match.

"This is a blast to play in," stated Carey, who bypassed the Norfolk County event just to play in the Cup. "This is a great event. It's a lot of fun."

Hillman racked up four birdies and fired a 2-under 70 on his own ball. After halving the front nine, Hillman turned it on with birdies on 10, 12 and 13 to help the pros build up an insurmountable advantage.

"After we switched the batting order on the fifth tee, it seemed to get us going," Ghelfi said. "I

knew with Josh he'd be doing most of the damage and I'd be along to help out."

The final match was won by the amateur team of Kittansett members Don Anderson and Claude Hoopes, who defeated the pro team of Craig Garris of Ballymeade and the Ridge Club's John Boniface, 2 and 1.

"We weren't going to win this match unless we had birdies," said Garris, the president of the chapter who gladly accepted the trophy. "They made few mistakes. Don Anderson made two birdies ... and he was down the middle all day. But, we got the Cup and that's all that matters."





The amateurs lead the series, 9-7, with two ties.

In the feature match of the day, Kittansett assistant Josh Hillman (the reigning Cape Cod chapter champion) and partner Bob McGraw (New Seabury) fell to the amateur tandem of Rick Rainville (Olde Barnstable) and Ed Kangas (Sandwich Hollows), 2½-½.

Hillman was scheduled to be paired with Wessner points leader Mike Ghelfi. However, Ghelfi's wife, Karen, went into labor with their first child late Saturday afternoon and McGraw stepped in and played well.

When McGraw made an 18-foot putt on the 18th hole, it looked as if the pros would halve their game, but Rainville drained a six-foot birdie to trump McGraw and clinch the overall match for the amateurs.

A pair of former Cape Cod Amateur champions – Jim Horvath (Dennis Pines) and John Shields (Hyannisport) – beat pros Craig Garris (Ballymeade) and Merry Holway (Olde Barnstable), 21/2-1/2.

The pros made it respectable when the Quashnet Valley duo of golf director Bob Chase and head pro Kevan Evangelista staved off amateurs Lee Dion (Olde Barnstable) and Kevin Barrows (Cape Cod Country Club) for a 2-1 win.


















Pro's Recapture Cape Cod Cup

Amateur team takes Cape Cod Cup, 12-9

MASHPEE - After getting spanked last year by the biggest margin of victory in Cape Cod Cup history, the amateur team got revenge yesterday, beating the local professionals, 12-9.

The win gives the amateurs a 10-8-2 lead in the series.

The amateurs won four of the seven matches, with two teams posting shutout victories, while the pros avoided the most lopsided defeat in the event's history with the final two matches going in their favor, 51/2-1/2.

The overall winner of the day was the Willowbend layout as the players toured the Bend and the Bog nines of the 27-hole course. Swirling 20-knot winds and early rains made the course tougher than usual.

Birdies were hard to come by and bogeys were the norm in a number of matches. It was universally agreed that the stiff breezes made the course hard to navigate.

The amateurs came loaded for bear with two U.S. Senior Amateur qualifiers and a U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship qualifier on this year's roster.

The day's most impressive performance was the pro tandem of Bob Chase and Kevan Evangelista of Quashnet Valley Country Club. The pair scored a 3-0 win in the day's final match over the amateur team of Herb Aikens of Pinehills and Dennis Pines' Jim

Horvath. Chase, director of golf won 13, 14 and 15 to go 2-up." at Quashnet Valley, and Evangelista, the club's head pro, totaled seven birdies and finished 5under-par.

For the amateurs, the Seagulls Fourball champion team of Oyster Harbors' Joe Keller and Hyannis Golf Club's Mike Boden roughed up host pro Allan Menne and his partner, Kevin Walker of Nantucket Golf Club, 3-0.

Keller was just back from his run at the U.S. Senior Amateur Championship in Indiana. "He was fun to watch," praised Walker. "He really was impressive with the management of his game."

The Keller-Boden tandem jumped out to an early lead with three birdies on the front nine.

"We played OK," said Boden, a reinstated amateur and an owner of a local car dealership. "Joe is so steady. He rarely gets rattled and that is huge in tournament play."

The other 3-0 match won by the amateurs saw first-time Cup player Scott Beers, a two-time Willowbend club champion, and two-time Cape Cod Amateur champion John Shields of Hyannisport blank the pro duo of Craig Garris of Ballymeade and another first-time Cup player, Jeff Halunen of Pocasset.

"It was a tight match," Shields said. "We had them 1-up after the front nine and we were losing the back nine until we

Steve Molis of Pocasset and another first-time player, Chris Overshiner of Bay Pointe Country Club, were the other victorious amateur team, rolling to a 21/2-1/2 win over Rick Baptist of White Cliffs and Olde Barnstable Fairgrounds director of golf Mike Ghelfi.

We only made one birdie between us," said Baptist. "Add to that the fact that Chris has to be a short-game guru, with two chip-ins and always leaving himself short tap-in putts all day, and the outcome was almost inevitable."

In the senior match, two firsttime players for the amateurs Dave Houghton of Captains and Willowbend's Eric Roberts topped pros Jim Knowles of Highland Links and Willowbend's Bill Tramantozzi, 2-1.

Richard, a finalist in last year's Cape Cod Amateur, played with a herniated disc in his neck, just the third round of golf for him in the past month.

Pro's Nip Am's 11-10 in Cape Cod Cup

LAKEVILLE – Cranberry Valley professional Joe McNulty rolled in a six-foot putt on the final hole in the day's final match to give his team a 2-1 win and lift the professionals to an 11-10 win yesterday in the 21st edition of the Cape Cod Cup. The win by the professionals, the third time in the 21 matches that they have edged the amateurs by an 11-10 margin, closes the amateur overall lead in the competition to 10-9-2.

McNulty and his partner, Mike Carroll of the Country Club of New Seabury topped the amateur tandem of Dennis Highlands' Jim Horvath and LeBaron Hills club champion Ricker Love in the match played at Love's home course.

It marked only the fourth time in its 21 year existence that the Cape Cod Cup competition between area amateurs and Cape Cod Chapter of the New England PGA golf professionals ventured over the bridges, this time to the pristine, 6,790-yard LeBaron Hills layout. The course offered exactly what this competition wanted, something fair and demanding which in turn brought out some top quality golf and strategy for the matchplay format.

"This is a terrific layout," said amateur Ray Richard, a three-time Cape Amateur champion who teamed with seven-time Cape Amateur winner Kevin Carey to roll to a 3-0 victory over the Quashnet Valley professional tandem of Bob Chase and Kevin Evangelista. "It's not something you ordinarily see on Cape Cod." That twosome took advantage of the conditions and the course to finish at 5-under on their own ball when the match ended with two holes remaining. "They were awesome," Evangelista said. "It would have taken a spectacular round from us to even get close to them."

Other key matches had the professional team of Hyannisport's Mike Haberl and Ballymeade's Craig Garris holding off a furious backside blitz by Pinehills club champion Herb Aikens and his partner Crag Overshiner of Bay Pointe to log a 2-1 victory. "Herb was on fire from the ninth hole on," explained Haberl. "We had it going for a while, but then we missed some birdie opportunities and they closed the gap."

Barnstable director of golf Mike Ghelfi and Cape Cod National's Matt Walsh blanked the amateur tandem of Hyannisport's John Shields and Pocasset Golf Club's Steve Molis, 3-0. The pro team jumped out to a 2-up advantage after the front nine and never let up. "Matt carried us on the front side and after we lost 13 and 14 to let them get within one, we birdied the 15th to slow their momentum and get back on track," Ghelfi said. It was Ghelfi's 35-foot birdie putt on the 15th that won the hole for the professionals and gave them back a 2-up advantage.

The opening foursome featured three LeBaron Hills players – two members (Brian Baker and Brian Buckley) against head pro Tom Rooney and Country Club of New Bedford head pro Joe Cordani. The amateur tandem, which has four club championships between them, spanked the pros, 3-0 to give the amateur team the early advantage in hoping to make it two straight wins over the pro contingent.

A key victory for the professionals was in the senior division pairing that saw Bob Miller of the Club at Yarmouthport and Pocasset's Rich Iwaszko blank the amateur team of Bob Tribou of Pocasset and his brother Bill of Poquoy Brook. Iwaszko was the spark for the seniors, logging four birdies and playing the front nine in 2-under-par. "Rich did everything well today," Miller said. "He was awesome. I was just happy to be there the few times he needed help."

As the teams mingled following the matches, Miller summed up the whole experience saying, "It was a great day out there and it was done with the whole spirit of the tournament in mind. It's a chance for all of us to meet some new people and have some fun. It really does a lot to promote competition and camaraderie,"

AMATEURS RECAPTURE CAPE COD CUP

MASHPEE-In what is starting to become a pattern, the team that loses the Cape Cod Cup the previous year avenges that defeat by capturing the Cup the following year. It was not all bad for the professionals' side as the team of Allan Menne (Hyannis GC) and Tom Rooney (Lebaron Hills) threw a shutout at amateurs Don Anderson (Kittanset) and Jim Horvath (Dennis Highlands), 3 – 0. After going 2-down after three holes, the pro's got on a birdie train and rallied to win the front nine, 1-up. They also won the back nine 1-up to grab all three points. "We made five birdies and no bogeys all day", said Menne. "Tom played outstanding golf and putted well. This was a good match."

Another pro tandem that did well was the Quashnet Valley team of Bob Chase and Kevan Evangelista who took 21/2 points from the amateur team of Doug Clapp (Old Sandwich Links) and Scott Nickerson (New Seabury). "Kevan played super on the back nine", said Chase. "We tied the front nine. The match was closer than the final score indicates."

It was the amateur domination in the other three matches that locked up the victory. In the senior division, New Seabury club champion Rich Bailey and Hyannis GC's Dick King topped the pro's pairing of Brian Hamilton (Eastward Ho) and Rick Iwaszko (Pocasset), 2-1. "The performance Dick put on was remarkable", Hamilton said.

Dave Houghton (Captains) and Bill Tribou (Poquoy Brook) grabbed a 2-1 win over White Cliffs' Rick Baptist and Olde Barnstable's Mike Ghelfi. "They could do no wrong", Ghelfi said of the amateur duo. "They put up a five-under round and we just couldn't respond well enough to it."

The day's final match had Hyannisport's John Shields and Bruce Baker of Lebaron Hills take a 2 $1/2 - \frac{1}{2}$ victory from professionals Graig Garris (Ballymeade) and Mike Haberl (Hyannisport). After an even front nine, the amateurs won the 10^{th} hole and never looked back.

Even with the competition being fierce at times, in the long run it goes down as a fun days of golf and friendship. Add a perfect fall day and it doesn't get much better.

"This was my first Cape Cod Cup" said Clapp, "and it was just as advertised. I don't get to see these guys too much so that made it even better. It's a lot of fun".

HYANNISPORT – For the sixth consecutive year of the annual Cape Cod Cup match between area professionals and amateurs, the team that dropped the event the previous year gained a measure of revenge the following year as the professionals avenged last year's loss to the amateurs with a 12-9 victory yesterday at the Hyannisport Club.

With the win, the professionals narrowed the gap in the 23-year-old event, as the amateurs now hold an 11-10-2 advantage.

It's the second time the Cup has been held at The 'Port and the results were the same as the first time with the pros holding sway and leaving with the hardware.

As has so often been the case, the match was not decided until the final pairing finished with the professional tandem of Rusty Gunnarson of Rochester Golf Club and reigning Cape Cod Chapter of the New England PGA champion Allan Menne of Hyannis Golf Club eeking out a 2-and-1 win over the amateur duo of Herb Aikens of Pinehills and Dennis Pines' Jim Horvath.

Last year at New Seabury, it was Aikens who was on the winning side of the final match to help give the amateurs the win.

The tides were turned on him this year as the pro team notched a 3-up win on the front nine, only to see the amateurs grab a 2-up victory on the back nine. However, the overall went to the pros by a 1-up margin.

Teams get points by winning the front nine, the back nine and the overall match.

"We jumped out to a 3-up lead, but a couple of bad swings on our part together with some good swings on their side got them right back into it," said Gunnarson. "The key hole in the match was the 16th where Allan made a great eagle-3. We needed it."

"It was a great match," Horvath said. "There were some momentum swings, but they did a great job to hold us off."

It was a tight match throughout the rain-soaked afternoon as the players had to battle the cold and wet along with a perfectly manicured, lightning-fast Hyannisport track.

The amateurs had the early momentum as the senior team of Dave Houghton of Captains and Cape Cod National's John Crook grabbed a 2-1 win over the pro team of Bob Chase of Quashnet Valley and host pro Rick Johnson.

A string of three birdies on holes No. 6, 7 and 8 enabled the pros to win the front nine. However, a back-9 birdie blitz enabled the amateurs to grab the other two points in the match.

The second match to finish saw the amateur duo of Dennis Konary Jr. of Olde Barnstable and Mike Walker of Oyster Harbors roll to a 3-0 win over the pro team of Craig Garris (Ballymeade) and Quashnet Valley's Kevin Evangelista.

"I'm more upset with the way I played than the weather," said Garris. "We gave them three holes with 3-putt greens. You can't expect to win doing that."

The amateurs won the ninth hole to break up a tie on the front nine then a string of four birdies on holes 13 through 16 sealed the match.

"We really had it going," Walker said. "That stretch on the back nine really energized us. As a team we were five or six-under par."

The pros started to come back over the next two matches.

Jim Campbell and Mike McGoldrick of Cape Cod National broke open an even match with a













1/2 victory over the Hyannisport tandem of John Shields and club champion Jay Riley.

The next match turned the tide in the pros' favor as the six-time Seagulls Fourball Championship winning team of Kevin Carey and Joe Walker of Dennis Pines fell, 2-1, to Mark O'Brien of The Captains and Oyster Harbors' Tim Watroba.

"Joe gave them a good match," said Carey. "The way I played, I should have stayed at work. Joe couldn't have done any worse alone."

Walker had six birdies on his own ball while Carey was uncharacteristically blanked on the birdie level.

"It was a real team effort," said O'Brien. "I played well on the front and Tim took over on the back nine. It worked well enough to get us the two points."

The best match of the day ended in a draw as the pro team of Mike Haberl of the home course and Mike Ghelfi of Hyannis Golf Club halved the team of Brian Secia of Miacomet on Nantucket and Hyannis' Matt Sheran.

It was close all the way," Secia said. "Neither team could get a foothold on the other and it came down to the last hole."

The biggest win for the pros was 3-0 victory by Greg Yeomans of the Bay Club and Joe Cordani of the Country Club of New Bedford over two formidable players – Dick King of Hyannis Golf Club and Joe Keller of Oyster Harbors.

The key was the white-hot putter of Yeomans, who buried lengthy putt after lengthy putt.

"He did not miss a putt all day," Keller said.

So, the Cape Cod Cup now rests in the hands of the pros of the Cape Cod Chapter of the New England PGA for another year when the best of Cape face off in what has become a great day of competition and camaraderie.



Cape Cod Cup repeat for pros

OSTERVILLE – For the first time in seven tries, the team that won the Cape Cod Cup the previous year managed to hold onto the trophy that symbolizes the winner of the annual Pro vs. Amateur golf showdown.

The 24th edition of this storied event, which pits the area's top amateurs against a team of pros from the Cape Cod Chapter of the New England PGA, was one of the more lopsided wins for the professional contingent as they thumped the amateurs, 14-7 at Oyster Harbors.

Only one amateur team managed to win its match as Mike Boden (Sandwich Hollows) and John Shields (Hyannisport), topped New Seabury's Brendan Reilly and Jim Campbell of Cape Cod National, 2 1/2 - 1/2. The amateur tandem of host club member Mike Walker and Olde Barnstable's Dennis Konary halved its match against Kevan Evangelista of Quashnet Valley and Captains Golf Course director of golf Mark O'Brien, 11/2-11/2.

The rest of the day belonged to the professionals, who won each of the five other matches. Four were decided by 2 1/2 - 1/2 scores, the other by a 2-1 mar-

The pros were defending the title they won last year at Hyannisport, when they topped the

amateurs 12-9 in a steady rain. This time around there was no rain, moderate fall temperatures and a golf course that was as pristine as any in the area.

"The golf course was perfect," praised Campbell. "The greens rolled beautifully. There could not be any complaints about anything to do with the course."

The opening match set the tone for the day as host pro Sean Edmonds and his partner Brad Wheatley jumped on their opponents Dick King of Hyannis Golf Club and Oyster Harbors' Ken Corcoran early and never let up.

"I had it going early and Brad picked it up on the back," Edmonds said. "There was nothing flashy, but we were steady and made some big birdies at opportune times."

One of those was an Edmonds' 20-foot curler on the par-3 fifth hole with King a foot away for a sure par.

"It was like that all day," King said. "They had answers for us the entire round."

The second group to finish was the senior pairing and the pro twosome of Rusty Gunnarson (Rochester Golf Club) and Al Lupis (PGA Lifetime Member), who boosted the pro advantage to 5-1 after dropping Cape Cod National's John Crook and Dennis Pines' Jim Horvath, 2 1/2-1/2.

The pro team broke it open

with Gunnarson birdies on holes 7, 8 and 9.

"We got to 4-up at the turn, but I've seen Jim Horvath get that putter of his warmed up and turn a match completely around," Gunnarson said. "We were in a comfort zone on the back nine, but we never took our foot off the pedal."

Breathing life into the amateur team was Walker and Konary when they halved their match. But when the pro duo of Joe Ferreira IV of White Cliffs Country Club and Sean Cahalane of The Captains stunned the amateur twosome of Herb Aikens (Pinehills) and reigning Cape Cod Amateur Champion Brian Secia (Miacomet), 21/2-1/2, The floodgates were open and the pro team was taking no prisoners.

"This is a great event for Cape Cod golf,"said one of the founders of this event, Jim Horvath.

Pros enjoy anniversary at Cape Cod Cup

HYANNISPORT – Twenty-five years ago, Dennis Highlands amateur Jim Horvath presented an idea to Mick Herron and Rich Iwaszko of the Cape Cod chapter of the New England PGA to create a tournament that pitted area professionals and amateurs in a match play competition.

Thursday a group of 28 pros and amateurs faced off to celebrate the silver anniversary of the Cape Cod Cup at the Hyannisport Club. The pros took their third straight victory, 13-8, and now own a slim 12-11-2 series lead.

"The Cape Cod chapter pros have been terrific in keeping it going," Horvath said. "A lot of professionals wouldn't want to play against a team of amateurs because everybody thinks they're supposed to win, but there are a lot of good amateurs on Cape Cod, so we've been pretty competitive."

The seven matches teed off at pristine Hyannisport on a brisk, cloudless day. There were three points at stake in each match: one for the front nine, one for the back nine and overall.

Horvath and amateur partner, Dave Houghton of The Captains, swept their match with a 3-0 win over pros Phill Trouno (Miacomet) and Steve Demmer (Kittansett).

James Kroeger (New Bedford) and Alex Stimpson (Woods Hole) were the only other amateur pair to top their professional counterparts, Greg Yeomans (Bay Club) and Joe Cordani (New Bedford), 21/2-1/2.

The pros were led by Matt Baran of Oyster Harbors and Brad Wheatley of Cape Cod National. They blanked Paul Heffernan and Kevin Carey, 3-0. The pros won four of the other matches by a 2½ to ½ margin.

Strong putting helped the pro tandem of Joe Ferreira V (White Cliffs) and Kevan Evangelista (Quashnet Valley) edge John Shields (Hyannisport) and Andrew Maher (Hyannisport), 2-1.

"We made a bunch of six- and eight-foot putts and that made the difference," Ferreira said.

The Cup has been played at the Hyannisport Club twice before, in 1998 and 2004, with the professionals winning both matches.

Horvath estimated more than 85 amateurs and over 70 professionals have competed in the event over the 25 years.

"We look at the guys that have played well throughout the year and we always try to have new people," Horvath said of choosing his amateur team.


Hyannisport pro Mike Haberl was the happy to host the event.

The annual competition pits 14 of the Cape's best amateur golfers against a professional side representing the Cape Cod Chapter NEPGA. Each match has three points at stake.

The amateurs won the back nine and the overall, shooting 6-under par for the afternoon. The status of the Cup was now tied, 4 1/2 to 4 1/2.

However, the next three matches all went to the pros, and all by 3 - 0 margins.

Pros Jesse Schectman and Brad Sherman combined to birdie 9 different holes and edged the Dennis team of Jim Horvath and Bill Van Stratum. Kevan Evangelista and Tracy Djerf, with a total of 6 birdies, took all three points from amateurs Dave Houghton and Dick King. In the third shutout, which featured three Methodist College alums, pros Jay Askew and Chad Schofield recorded 3 birdies apiece to nip Whitney Trimble and Matt Sheran.

With the Cup outcome already decided, the final match was the closest of the day as longhitting amateurs Tim Norton and Chad Crocker tied Greg Yeomans and Bob Giusti. Each team was 6-under par and won 1 1/2 points.

The pros now lead the popular series, 13 - 12 and there have been two ties.

"Great golf, great day, great course", said Horvath with a smile afterwards. "With greens as perfect as Pocasset, you can make a lot of putts, and the pros did just that. I can't recall the last time I said 'nice birdie' as much as I did today. What a spectacular display their team put on."


















Amateurs, Pro's Tie in Cape Cod Cup

Brewster - When you combine immaculate course conditions, excellent autumn weather and 28 of the area's best amateur and professional players, you have the recipe for wonderfully competitive golf.

And that is what happened at Cape Cod National Golf Club in Brewster Monday in the 28th annual Cape Cod Cup as the amateurs rallied to tie the professionals, 10½-10½.

The match featured two teams of 14 players each representing top amateurs and pros of the Cape Cod Chapter of the New England PGA. There were seven four-ball matches in all with three points at stake in each match.

This was the third tie in the 28-year history of the event. The pros still lead the overall series, 13-12-3.

After the front nine scores were in, the pros were ahead in four matches, the amateurs led one and two other matches were tied. However, the amateurs warmed up and turned the tide, winning or tying every point on the back nine.

The amateurs were close to completing an historic comeback and win the Cup until professional Bob Miller chipped in for a birdle on the final hole. That enabled Miller and partner Mark O'Brien to tie their match with Rich Monaghan and Dave Houghton.

The amateurs' raily began in the first match when amateur Michael Walker birdied the 18th hole to give him and partner Whitney Trimble a tie on back nine with Jay Askew and Joe Ferreira. Askew and Ferreira were 6-under for the match and Walker and Trimble 5-under.

The second match saw pros Sean Edmunds and Matt Baran scorch the front nine in 4-under for a 4-up lead. However, amateurs Don Reycroft and Dave Pierce shot 3-under on the back nine to grab an important point. Professionals John Paesani and Chad Schofield took $2V_2$ points from Brian Secia and Herbie Aikens in the third match, yet the score is deceiving. The teams tied the front nine for a half point each. The difference in the match was a 20-foot birdle Paesani made on the 16th hole to win the match and the back nine, 1-up.

Match four was another example of fine play on the front nine by professionals Joe McNulty and Chris Gagnon, as they jumped out to a 1-up lead. However, Matt Sheran and Tim Norton combined for three birdies on the back and took the match by a 2 and 1 margin.

With four matches on the board, the pro had 8 points and only needed three more to win the Cup for the second straight year. However, they fell just short.

Amateurs Alex Stimpson and Chad Crocker provided the only shutout of the day as they birdied every par 5, along with two other holes, to sweep three points from Brad Sherman and Jesse Schectmann.


This set the stage for the dramatics of the final two matches. Miller and O'Brien and Monaghan and Houghton tied the front nine for a half-point each. Monaghan's 15-foot birdle on No. 16 put his team 1-up on the back and in the match, and they had a certain par 4 wrapped up on the final. However, Miller hit a perfect chip from 35 feet that found the hole dead-center and deadlocked their match 1 1/2 - 1 1/2.

Fittingly the day came down to the final hole of the final match. Brendan Reilly's curling 25foot birdle on No. 9 gave him and pro partner Greg Richbourg a 1-up lead and a point after nine holes. But amateurs Joe Walker and Bill Van Stratum shot 4-under on the back to score a 2-1 and produce the overall tie.

The amateurs still lead the overall series, 18 to 14. There have been three ties.


















Pro's Repeat in Cape Cod Cup Golf Match
