

Bob Lenzion started playing golf during his sophomore year in high school at Alemany High School in Granada Hills, California and made it onto the golf team at California State University at Northridge as a walk-on where they won the 1969 NCAA Division II Championship. He graduated from there in 1972 with a degree in Mathematics.

After college Lenzion went to Vermont to work at the Arnold Palmer Golf Academy (later the Stratton Golf School) and stayed for 12 years. Bob grew up in Los Angeles and when he moved to Vermont, he thought he had died and gone to heaven. After leaving his Director of Golf position at the Stratton Golf School, Bob was hired as the PGA Head Professional at The Quechee Club where he worked for 12 years.

During the winters he played tours in South Africa, Asia, Australia, New Zealand and South America. Bob believes these experiences helped him win the 1986 PGA Club Professional Championship at PGA West in La Quinta, California. During the final round of the Championship, he went head-to-head with another NEPGA Hall of Fame member, Dana Quigley, for top honors. It was decided on the final hole in dramatic fashion. By winning, Bob became the first NEPGA Professional to capture the PGA Club Professional Championship. Bob won the NEPGA Assistants Championship in 1977 and again in 1978. He also played in the World Series of Golf, six PGA Championships, and was on two PGA Cup Teams. Bob won the Skip Wogan Player of the Year award in 1992 which gave him more confidence in his game and led to a win in the Chile Open on the South American Tour the same year. After leaving his position at The Quechee Club, he qualified for the European Seniors Tour and played in their events for 12 years, including one year (2000) on the PGA Champions Tour. Bob won two tournaments on the European Seniors Tour, the 1998 Turkish Senior Open and the 2005 Egyptian Senior Open.

Bob spent nearly his entire PGA professional career in New England and feels that it is a big part of him. Over the years he has made many great friends in New England. "I helped raise my two fantastic kids (Kriya and Jonathan) here and will always be a New Englander at heart."
